It's an important location in the development of our area and an apt location to celebrate our creeks by helping to support the Creeks.

Every year multiple tons of trash are removed from our creeks and lakes during the annual Granite Creek Cleanup. This year alone 10 Tons were pulled out. One Man's Treasure highlights art made from pieces removed during the Cleanup, with funds going to support the creeks.





<u>Summer conditions</u> -- low water levels and lots of sunshine -- combined with excess nutrients cause an unsightly (and smelly) situtation on Watson and Willow Lakes: algae blooms, prolific plant growth, and

slime. In July, we assisted ADEQ in collecting water samples from Watson Lake. This is what it looked like.
